## **Summary School Self-Evaluation Report**

#### 1. Introduction

Our school is a co-educational vertical school in Blackrock Co. Dublin. There are 22 teachers and 430 pupils in the school. #### 1.1 The focus of the evaluation

We undertook a school self-evaluation of teaching and learning in the area of Mathematics with a particular focus on problem solving.

This report summarises the strengths that were identified and the areas that have been prioritised for improvement.

#### 2. Summary of school self-evaluation findings

We collected information from parents, pupils and teachers in preparing this report. We also looked at children's copybooks and we examined the results of the standardised tests.

2.1 We found that our school has strengths in the following areas:

#### Strengths

The children achieve very good test results in the standardised tests. There is a wide range of teaching methodologies used. Varied assessment tools are utilised to monitor the children's progress. The copybooks show a clear and organised layout. 82% of parents say that their children like Maths.

We know these are our strengths because the evidence from our evaluation shows this.

2.2 We have decided to prioritise the following areas for development:

#### Areas for development

Provide more concrete materials. Improve how we meet the needs of our high achievers. Teach the language of mathematics. Further improve on how we communicate to parents about Mathematics.

We have decided to prioritise these areas because we believe that they will lead to improvement in the children's ability to problem solve.
